Toodyay Shire Goes Eco Friendly

The Shire of Toodyay has recently installed clean energy systems to both the Shire Depot on Railway Road and Toodyay Library in Stirling Terrace.

The Toodyay Library has a 10.335kWp system and the Shire Depot has a 19.61kWp system. The installation of these solar panels is estimated to produce 70% of the energy consumption and save approximately \$9,000 in annual electricity costs.

President's Pen - Cr Brian Rayner

For all residents and rate payers of Toodyay, I am Councillor Brian Rayner, newly elected President of the Toodyay Shire Council.

Council elections held on Saturday 21 October 2017 resulted in a huge voter turnout. For the first time Council opted for a postal election, conducted by the Western Australian Electoral Commission. Across the board the turnout was above 50 percent, up from previous elections of below 30 percent.

The people have spoken in re-electing Councillor Greenway (West Ward), Councillor Chitty (East Ward) and Councillor Rayner (North Ward unopposed). Two new Councillors were elected: Councillor Di Granger (Central Ward) replaced our previous President David Dow, and Councillor Benjamin Bell (East Ward) who was elected for a two-year term, fills the position left vacant following the resignation of Councillor Kate Wood in April this year.

Volunteers Primed for Rural Urban Defence

Shire of Toodyay Bush Fire Brigade volunteers recently attended a regional Rural Urban Interface (RUI) exercise to practice a bush fire scenario impacting a residential area. The exercise, held in Wundowie was attended by approximately 100 volunteers from Toodyay, Northam and York.

The exercise involved assessing properties for their defendability before running a mock defence of defendable properties.

Feedback from the exercise was positive. You can assist our volunteers by ensuring your property is well prepared for this bush fire season.

Prohibited Burning Period

The Shire of Toodyay entered the Prohibited Burning Period on 1 November 2017. This means NO burning is permitted. Penalties will apply.

Your property should also now be prepared as per the Shire's Fire Break Order or approved variation. Inspections have begun and penalties will be issued where the standard has not been met.

Your property must be maintained in a compliant condition until the 30 April 2018.



Skeleton weed in Western Australia

The Skeleton Weed Program is a coordinated approach to managing Skeleton weed in Western Australia. The Program is delivered by DAFWA under a service delivery arrangement with the Grains, Seed and Hay Industry Management Committee, appointed by the Minister of Agriculture in June 2010. The Committee was re-appointed in June 2015 under the 'Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Industry Funding Schemes (Grains) Regulations 2010' to manage pests affecting the grains industry (currently skeleton weed and three-horned bedstraw).

Skeleton Weed (Chondrilla juncea) is a perennial plant that develops from a rosette into a sparsely-leafed plant of up to 1m tall. Erect, branched stems with little or no foliage are produced in early October, giving the plant an untidy look. Skeleton weed is most recognisable when flowering in summer and autumn.

Skeleton weed has yellow daisy-like flowers about 20mm across and usually flowers from December until May (though it has been found flowering in July in Perth). The seeds are about 3-4mm long with a parachute to aid wind dispersal. Mature plants have an extensive root system with a tap root over 2m long and lateral roots that radiate up to 50cm.

Where to Find Skeleton Weed

Along the wheatbelt area of Western Australia, skeleton weed is most likely to be found in grain crops at harvest time. It has been found in the South West Land Division; on farms in a number of wheatbelt shires, in the Perth metropolitan area, Fremantle and further south as far as Albany, and along roadsides, railway lines, on industrial land and around ports. It is occasionally found in bushland and lawns.

Declaration Categories

All landholders need to prevent the movement of seed and/or root fragments from their properties in produce (grain, seed and hay), wool, machinery and vehicles.


The Program's strategies include:

- improving landholders ability to find, report and eradicate skeleton weed;
- advising on management techniques; •
- encouraging local grower groups, known as Local Action Groups, to participate in cooperative surveillance, reporting, management and eradication from their local areas; and
- incentives including search assistance and winter treatments (where landholders are compliant with program requirements).

Tomato Potato Psyllid (TPP) Quarantine Arrangements

The Department of Primary Industry and Regional Development has issued a new Quarantine Area Notice (QAN) for control of the Tomato Potato Psyllid. The new notice applies from 1 November 2017. The new QAN applies to commercially-produced and home -grown host plants or nursery stock grown within the Quarantine Area. The Quarantine Area includes the Perth metropolitan area and nearby Local Government areas including Toodyay, and aims to limit the spread into horticultural production areas in regional Western Australia.

Movement and treatment conditions only apply to host plants from the QAN and not to host fruit and vegetables, or machinery and equipment. Affected plants include tomatoes, potatoes, pepper, paprika, capsicum, chilli, eggplant, Tamarillo, potato vive, ground cherry, matrimony vine, goji berry, African Boxwood, field bindweed and sweet potato. Prescribed treatment is required for host plants, such as seedlings or nursery stock, where they are moving from within the Quarantine Area to specified local government areas in Western Australia.

Additional treatment guidelines will be provided in the 'Approved manner of preparation for movement from the TPP Quarantine Area' available at www.agric.wa.gov.au/tpp .

Adopt-a-trap program

A community surveillance program is underway as part of the TPP Transition to management plan, led by the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD). More than 1000 residential properties in and around the Perth metro area will host a 'sticky trap' in their garden this spring. Each trap will be inspected by department entomologists and any psyllids collected will be tested for the bacterium Candidatus Liberibacter solanacearum (CLso). There have been no detections of CLso in WA to date.

Shire of Toodyay 2017 Draft Local Planning Strategy

The consultation period for the Draft Local Planning Strategy concluded on

3 November 2017. The community of Toodyay really came on board and addressed planning issues that are important to the future of the Shire. We would like to thank everyone who sent a submission in and supported the community engagement in this way.

Approximately 60 submissions have been received

A Schedule of Submissions is being compiled at present that will summarise each submission received and provide an assessment of the content of the submission.

A Report will be presented to the December Forum of Council and then the December Ordinary Meeting to determine the next step for the Strategy.

If the Strategy is adopted by Council in December, it will then be forwarded to the Western Australian Planning Commission for final approval.

The draft of the new Local Planning Scheme is currently being finalised in consultation with the Department of Planning and it is envisaged that it will be presented to the January Ordinary Meeting for adoption for advertising purposes. Prior to advertising the Scheme will need to be approved by the WAPC.

Shire of Toodyay Verge Trees

It is a common misconception that the Shire owns verge trees. Verge trees are growing on Crown Land, the Shire simply manages the trees when and where necessary and does not take ownership of a particular tree or trees.

Should a verge tree fall or be damaged as a result of a storm or high winds and cause damage to a resident's infrastructure, the Shire cannot be held responsible for any damages as this is a naturally occurring event and part of living in the hills and a heavily treed environment.

It is the responsibility of the land owner to prune overhanging limbs encroaching into their fire break.

A verge tree will need to be deemed a hazard for a request to remove/prune a tree to be considered. If you have concerns about the safety of a verge tree you can 'Report an Issue' from our Website's home page or call the Works Depot on 9574 9360.
